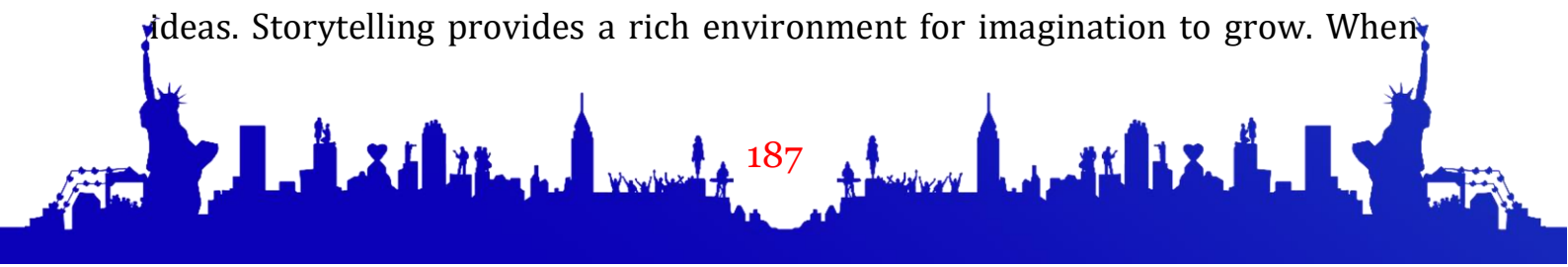
### **Introduction**

#### The Role of Teachers and Parents in Using Storytelling Effectively

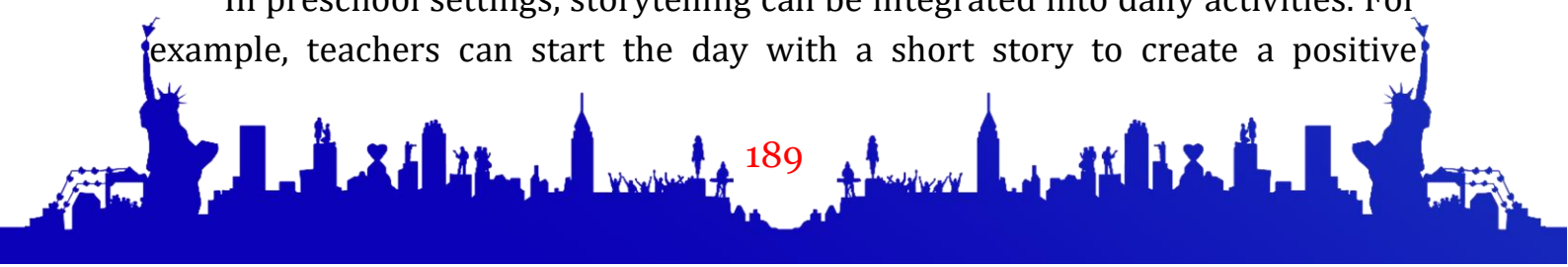
