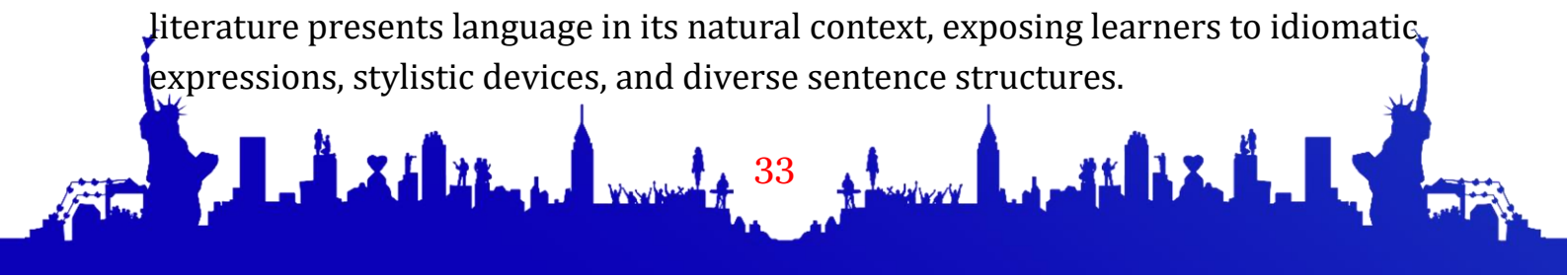

Reading stories engages the imagination and strengthens memory. Learners visualize scenes, remember plot details, and connect ideas, which improves cognitive abilities.

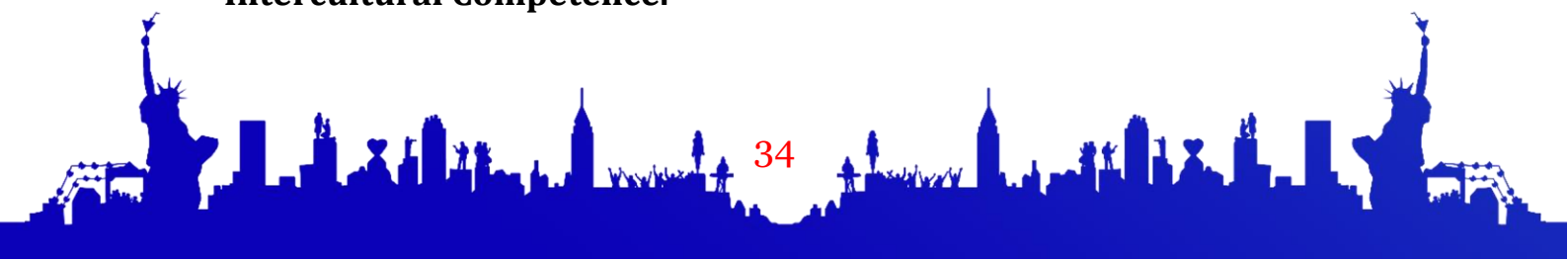
Cultural Awareness Through Literature.

Lack of Motivation.

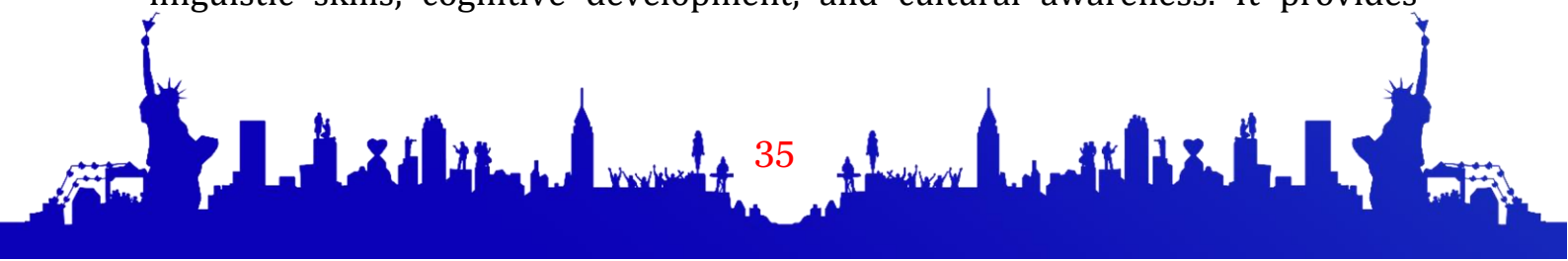
Not all students are interested in literature. Teachers can address this by choosing engaging and relatable texts.
