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Abstract

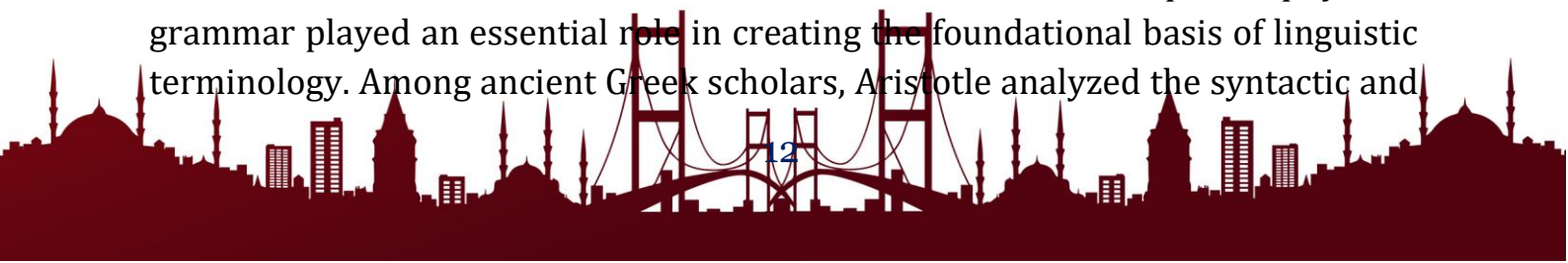

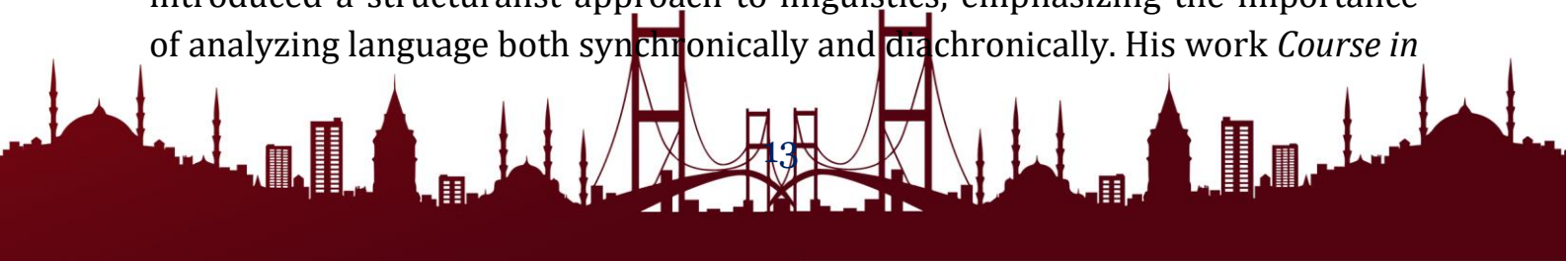

In Western Europe, scholars such as William of Ockham and Roger Bacon also contributed to the development of linguistic terminology. Roger Bacon proposed that linguistics should be studied using scientific methods, emphasizing the importance of observation and experimentation. He expressed ideas on the natural development of language and the universal principles of grammar. William of Ockham, by introducing the principle known as "Ockham's Razor," advocated for the simplification of linguistic expressions. He argued that linguistic terms should be free from unnecessary complexity, thereby influencing the development of Western linguistic theory. With the advancement of modern linguistics, research into the standardization, systematization, and classification of linguistic terms has deepened further. Ferdinand de Saussure introduced a structuralist approach to linguistics, emphasizing the importance of analyzing language both synchronically and diachronically. His work *Course in*



General Linguistics marked a turning point in the development of linguistic science and reinforced the theoretical foundations of linguistic terminology.

Noam Chomsky, by proposing the theory of generative grammar, deepened understandings of language structure and innate human linguistic capabilities. His introduction of the concepts of “deep structure” and “surface structure” contributed to further systematization of linguistic terminology.

Roman Jakobson conducted significant research in the fields of phonology and semiotics, studying the communicative and poetic functions of language. His works on phonological terminology laid the groundwork for the development of modern phonetics and morphonology. Additionally, linguists such as Lev Shcherba, André Martinet, and Michael Halliday made substantial contributions to the classification of linguistic terms and the in-depth analysis of their semantic and functional aspects, thereby playing a significant role in the progress of modern linguistics.
