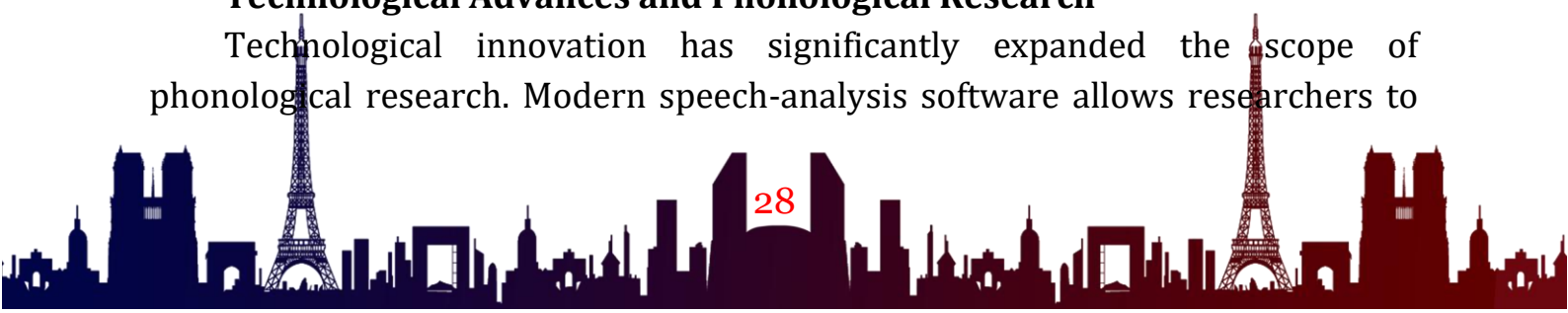
Sociophonetic Variation and Emerging Sound Changes
