

THE ROLE OF DIGITAL COMMUNICATION IN THE DEVELOPMENT OF
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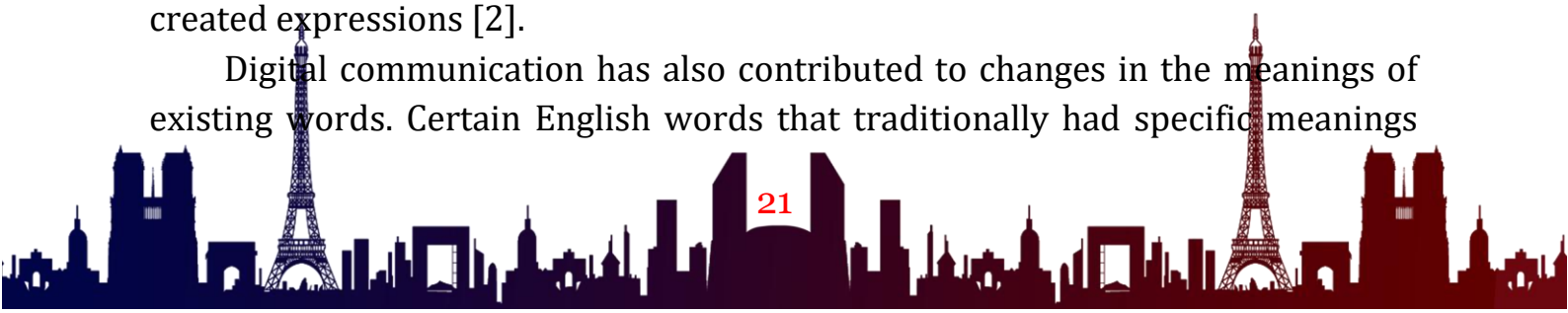

The research also emphasizes the importance of distinguishing between informal digital language and standard English in educational contexts.

As a result, speakers frequently employ abbreviations, shortened forms, compounds, and newly created expressions [2].

For example, *post*, *stream*, *tag*, *block*, and *channel* are now commonly used to describe digital activities as well as their traditional meanings. This demonstrates that technological developments can influence not only the creation of new vocabulary but also the semantic development of existing lexical units [3].

Another important characteristic of digital language is its speed of dissemination. A lexical innovation can be introduced by a relatively small online community and subsequently become familiar to millions of users. The analysis concentrated on four major mechanisms of vocabulary development: **semantic extension, abbreviation, compounding, and conversion.**

Semantic extension occurs when an existing word develops an additional meaning. Abbreviation is another common characteristic of online communication. Forms such as *DM* (*direct message*), *FAQ* (*frequently asked questions*), and *IRL* (*in real life*) demonstrate how users shorten frequently occurring expressions in digital environments.

Compounding also plays an important role. Expressions such as *livestream*, *cyberbullying*, and *screen time* combine existing lexical elements to describe new technological or social realities.

Conversion involves using an existing lexical item as a different part of speech. Digital communication has contributed to the widespread use of verbs such as *to text*, *to message*, and *to stream* [6].

Results. The analysis demonstrates that digital communication has become a significant source of vocabulary development in contemporary English. The influence can be observed in several interconnected areas.

First, digital communication has encouraged the **creation of terminology for new activities and experiences**. As technology develops, speakers require specific words to describe activities that did not previously exist. Expressions such as *livestream*, *cyberbullying*, *screen time*, and *online shopping* have become increasingly common because they describe recognizable aspects of modern life.

Second, digital communication has accelerated the **semantic development of existing words**. A number of traditional English words have acquired meanings associated with digital technologies.

Although some of these abbreviations existed before the development of social media, their frequency and visibility have increased significantly in digital communication.

Another important result concerns the **informalization of communication**. Online platforms encourage users to communicate in a conversational and spontaneous manner. Consequently, expressions that might previously have been restricted to spoken or informal communication are increasingly visible in written digital discourse.

For example, expressions such as *OMG*, *LOL*, and *BTW* have become recognizable forms of informal online communication. Their importance lies not only in their abbreviated structure but also in their pragmatic function: they can express emotion, attitude, surprise, agreement, or a transition between topics [8].

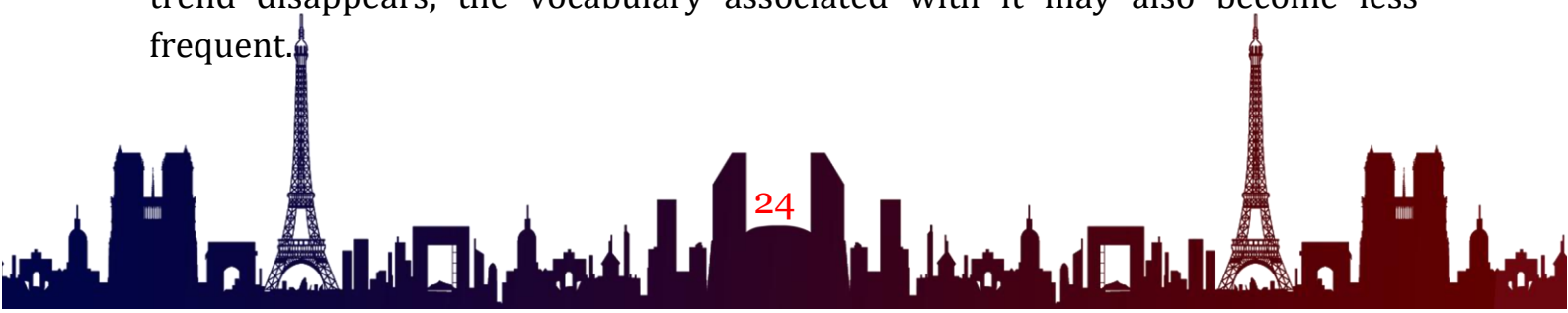

This acceleration makes the Internet an especially productive environment for linguistic innovation [1].

At the same time, not every digital expression becomes a permanent part of the English vocabulary. Some expressions are strongly associated with particular platforms, technologies, or temporary online trends. When the corresponding trend disappears, the vocabulary associated with it may also become less frequent.



Another important issue is the relationship between **digital language and standard English**. Digital communication often favors informality, creativity, and brevity. These characteristics can be useful in casual interaction but may not always be appropriate in academic or professional writing.

For English language teachers, this distinction is particularly important. Students encounter a considerable amount of informal English through social media, video platforms, online games, and messaging applications. Therefore, teachers can use selected examples of digital vocabulary to demonstrate how English changes according to context.

For instance, students can compare *I am going to send you a direct message* with the informal expression *I'll DM you*. Such comparisons help learners understand not only vocabulary but also register, context, and communicative appropriateness. The findings also support the idea that digital communication contributes to the democratization of lexical innovation. New expressions can originate from ordinary users rather than from formal institutions. If an expression is repeatedly used and understood by a sufficiently large community, it may gradually become part of broader linguistic usage [9].

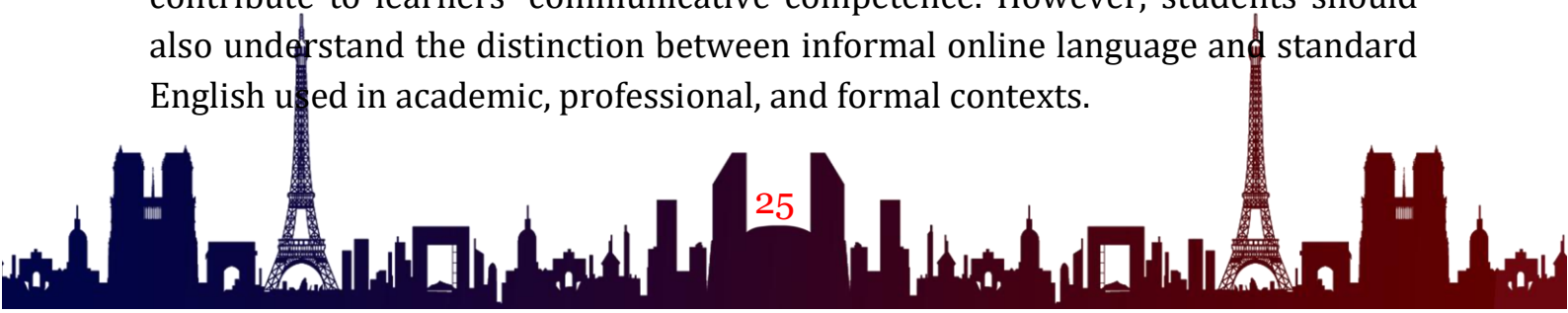
Therefore, contemporary English vocabulary should be studied as a dynamic system in which traditional lexical resources interact with technological, cultural, and social developments.
