The IELTS Reading section is a major challenge, assessing comprehension, information retrieval, inference, and text analysis. Success requires a comprehensive approach: applying strategies, expanding vocabulary, mastering grammar, and regular practice.

The section lasts 60 minutes, includes three parts, and consists of 40 questions. Answers must be transferred to the answer sheet within the time limit. The structure varies between IELTS General and Academic.

Differences Between IELTS Academic and General Training in the Reading Section

1. Types of Texts: Academic texts come from scientific journals, books, and official sources, often featuring complex content, diagrams, and graphs. General Training texts are more practical—announcements, instructions, newspaper articles, and official documents.

2. Difficulty Level: Academic texts use formal language and complex vocabulary, while General Training texts are simpler and closer to everyday communication.

3. Scoring: Academic texts are harder, so fewer correct answers are needed for a high score (e.g., Band 7 requires 30–32 correct answers). In General Training, texts are easier, but more correct answers are required (Band 7 = 34–35).

Conclusion: IELTS Academic is for university admission, while IELTS General Training is mainly for immigration and employment.

Main Question Types in the IELTS Reading Section





1. True/False/Not Given – Identify if the statement matches, contradicts, or is absent in the text.
2. Yes/No/Not Given – Similar to True/False/Not Given but assesses the author's opinion.
3. Matching Headings – Select headings that best summarize paragraphs.
4. Matching Information – Find paragraphs containing specific details.
5. Matching Features – Link information to names, places, or concepts.
6. Matching Sentence Endings – Pair sentence beginnings with correct endings.
7. Multiple Choice – Choose the correct answer (A, B, C, or D).
8. Summary/Sentence Completion – Fill in blanks using words from the text or a provided list.
9. Note/Table/Flowchart/Diagram Completion – Complete visual data with information from the text.
10. Short Answer Questions – Answer briefly using words from the text.
11. Global Multiple Choice – Identify the main idea of the text.
12. Categorisation – Assign information to the correct category.

How the IELTS Reading Test Takes Place:

After the Listening section, the Reading section begins without a break. Candidates receive a booklet with texts and an answer sheet. The examiner gives instructions, then candidates can open the booklet and start answering the questions. Answers must be written immediately, as there is no extra time for transfer. When the signal is given, writing must stop immediately.

Challenges of the IELTS Reading Test.

Limited time and large text volume – Three long texts and 40 questions in 60 minutes require fast reading and effective time management.

Complex topics and academic vocabulary – Texts often contain terms from science, economics, history, and ecology, while questions use synonyms and complex structures.

Paraphrased questions and traps – Questions rarely repeat exact phrases from the text, so it's important to recognize synonyms and hidden meanings.

Stress and concentration – High workload, time pressure, and challenging questions can cause stress, making it harder to focus.

How to Prepare for the IELTS Reading Test.

1. Practice with Official Tests – Use Cambridge IELTS materials to familiarize yourself with the format, question types, and vocabulary. Start





without a time limit to understand the answers, then practice under timed conditions.

2. Improve Reading Speed and Comprehension – Regularly read complex texts from different fields. Allocate time wisely:

20 minutes per section

60 minutes for the entire test

3. Master Skim Reading – Focus on quickly identifying key information rather than deep reading.

4. Read a Variety of Texts – Start with simpler literature and gradually move to articles, magazines, and books to expand vocabulary and comprehension.

5. Enhance Vocabulary – Learn prefixes, suffixes, and word formation patterns to understand unfamiliar words.

Negative prefixes: un-, ir-, mis- → responsible – irresponsible

Noun-forming suffixes: -ion, -ment, -ness → agree – agreement

How to Pass the IELTS Reading Test: Tips and Hacks

Identify key words - First, highlight important words in the questions, then look for them (or their synonyms) in the text.

Follow the order of the questions – Answers appear in the same sequence as the questions, making it easier to locate information.

Pay attention to details – True/False/Not Given and Yes/No/Not Given tasks often contain traps that slightly change the meaning.

Improve your speed-reading skills – Scan the text to find relevant sections instead of reading everything in detail.

Don't waste time on difficult questions – If unsure, skip and return later. It's better to answer more easy questions first.

Write answers immediately – There is no extra time at the end to transfer answers.

Practice under exam conditions – Solve tests with a timer to get used to the time limit.

Common Mistakes in the IELTS Reading Section

1. Spelling Errors – Even one incorrect letter makes an answer wrong.

✗ neighbor → incorrect ☒ neighbor → correct

2. Wasting Time on Difficult Questions – Spend no more than a minute on a tough question. Move on and return later if time allows.

3. Guessing Headings Without Understanding – Read the full text before choosing headings. Avoid random guessing.

4. Incorrect Word Choice in Gaps – Ensure the word fits grammatically.





✗ China made a huge sky scraper in urban construction → incorrect

☑ China made huge progress in urban construction → correct

5. Poor Time Management – Stick to a schedule:

Text 1: 9:06 – 9:26

Text 2: 9:26 – 9:46

Text 3: 9:46 – 10:06

If short on time, focus on multiple-choice and True/False/Not Given questions. Practice completing the test in 60 minutes.

IELTS Reading Test Scoring

In IELTS Reading, the score depends on the number of correct answers. The grading scale differs slightly between the Academic and General Training modules.

9.0: ~39–40 correct answers

8.0: ~35–37 (Academic) / 36–38 (General)

7.0: ~30–32 (Academic) / 32–34 (General)

Experiment: The Impact of Reading Strategies on IELTS Success

Objective: Assess how reading strategies affect IELTS Reading performance.

Method: 10 students took an IELTS Reading practice test (Cambridge IELTS 14, Test 2).

Group A (Traditional Reading): Read texts fully without strategies.

Group B (Strategy-Based Reading): Used skimming, scanning, and keyword identification.

Results: Group A: 23/40, struggled with time.

Group B: 30/40, completed faster with higher accuracy.

Conclusion: Reading strategies significantly improve efficiency and scores in IELTS Reading.

Future research could explore how different reading strategies affect specific question types or compare their effectiveness across various English proficiency levels. Additionally, a larger sample size could provide more comprehensive insights into strategy efficiency.
